IRIS is writing a book with a thousand authors across our region about what we are doing to build healthier and more resilient communities that will help future generations thrive.

Thinking Like a Community is both the book's title and an expression of our intent – we aim to produce a multi-platform book full of stories that showcases what we can accomplish when we think and act like a community united by shared values and needs. We plan to release this book at the NCW Community Success Summit in November, 2020.

With help from many fellow community members we have already gathered nearly 700 stories of success in this place including oral histories, videos, pictures of health and one-page stories that have been shared through our annual summits and the Success Story Exchange.

But we want and need more. We know there are more stories in every community across the region – stories that once shared can help someone else succeed. Stories that can help us maintain diverse, healthy ecosystems and foster a high quality of life for all. And stories about bridging cultural and political divides that grow heart and unity in the process.
